From Lulu Bowerman, Cabinet Member for Highways and Waste

We know just how important roads, and specifically their condition, are to the people of Hampshire and we're working hard to make them stronger – having invested extra funding so that we can make even more improvements to the 5,500 miles of roads that the County Council is responsible for.

The additional £22.5m investment over two years, on top of the £89m we typically spend annually to maintain the roads has so far enabled extra crews, equipment and materials to be brought in to repair even more road defects, like potholes, more quickly, as well as improve the surface quality of many more miles of road.

Latest data shows that between April and June this year, we've made good progress - having improved the surface of 345,655 square metres of road and repaired 18,505 road defects. And, with the autumn and winter weather in mind, 43,479 drains and gullies have also been cleared and cleaned, ready to cope with heavy rainfall. We'll soon be starting our winter maintenance season (from 1 October) and, as with previous years, our highways crews will be ready day and night to spread salt on the main routes when freezing road surface temperatures are forecast, in order to keep Hampshire moving.

We know that work to make improvements to the roads can sometimes be inconvenient to road users, so we appreciate people's patience as we keep up the momentum on this vital work.

We also wish to thank everyone who has reported road defects to us - such as potholes and other issues affecting the condition of the county's roads. Please continue to do so, because when you report a road issue to us, it means we can act more quickly to fix the problem and make our roads stronger.

You can do this via the OurHants app (which can be downloaded from the Apple or Google play store) or online via the County Council's website.

Following the allocation of additional funding dedicated to making Hampshire's roads stronger, i.e. committing an extra £22.5 million over two years to 31 March 2025 to boost road repairs, we've repaired almost 181,000 potholes and road defects, representing a 37% increase compared to the previous 12 months (April 2023 to April 2024).

In the period covered by this update, high numbers of road defects continue to be fixed, alongside the completion of larger resurfacing and planned maintenance schemes.

HCC Flooding Toolkit

Roke Manor Quarry extension of time for back filling

You might have seen this article in the [Romsey Advertiser](#) and [Hampshire Chronicle](#) about the extension of time for the back filling of Roke Manor Quarry being approved.

The quarry workings need to be re-filled using inert material from building sites. (Essentially this means that it is not contaminated - unlike traditional landfill).

I raised concerns on behalf of local residents over the time taken, and the impact on the local environment - particularly for those at Stanbridge Lakes and Old Salisbury Lane.

The challenge is that the slow down in the construction sector through the pandemic has not provided the material expected. Add to that the good news that increasingly waste materials from construction can be recycled and inevitably the length of time to obtain the volume needed to fill the quarry has lengthened.

My thanks to the [Hampshire Chronicle](#) and its group newspapers for publishing my opinion piece this week, which explains why [Hampshire County Council](#) is currently facing a financial challenge, and the action we are taking to address it.

"Let me be very clear: Hampshire County Council is not 'going bust'. We project our finances several years ahead. This allows us to foresee and understand the challenges in balancing the budget and continuing to deliver the services we are legally required to provide.

We are committed to transparency. Unlike some other councils, we believe in being open and honest with our residents, explaining the situation and describing the steps we are taking to address it.

Why is there such a gap in our budget? The County Council has a legal responsibility to carry out certain functions. We cannot say 'no' if someone asks for support, and in many cases, we cannot means-test or ask for a contribution toward the cost of providing a service."

Parking Scam – warning

A warning from [Test Valley Borough Council](#) who have been made aware of a scam parking fine text message currently doing the rounds. The message says they have received a parking fine and includes a link to pay it.

The council does not issue Parking Penalty Charge Notices via text messages. Genuine fines are sent by post.

If residents receive one of these texts, they should not click the link or pay the fine. Instead, report the scam by forwarding the text for free to 7726, as advised by Action Fraud and the National Cyber Security Centre.

National Planning Policy Consultation Response

Hampshire County Council has responded to the Government's proposals to change the National Planning Policy Framework. The response included the following concerns to proposed significant uplift in housing numbers in our area:

- Planning for homes must include supporting infrastructure.
- The proposed housing targets for Hampshire are overly ambitious.
- Environmental constraints cover 45% of Hampshire, affecting housing delivery.
- The annual target for new dwellings in Hampshire would increase from 5,884 to 10,071, which is considered excessive.
- The proposals and lack of transitional arrangements will have immediate impact on the 5-year land supply, undermining the plan-led system and resulting in speculative development.
- Collaboration between local authorities is crucial for meeting housing and employment needs. Strategic planning should align with existing local government boundaries.
- Improving the existing system of developer contributions is preferred over the new Infrastructure Levy.
- The shift towards active travel and sustainable transport planning is welcomed.
- The County Council supports the opportunity to more explicitly make the link between climate change adaptation and health and well-being.
- There should also be a stronger link between the built environment and natural environment and mental health and well-being.
- Planning policy should recognise the severity of air pollution as a public health issue.
- Strengthened policies on climate change are welcomed. Strategic planning can help mitigate and adapt to climate impacts.
