What a summer it's shaping up to be—sunshine, strawberries, and an unstoppable calendar of community events. I hope you're finding time to enjoy it all. Here's my latest County Councillor update for June/July:

#### M27 Junction 5-7 Overlay Scheme - Update from National Highways e-Bulletin - 30 June 2025

National Highways is progressing with the M27 Overlay Scheme between Junctions 5 and 7. Phase 3a (westbound lanes 3 and 4) is nearing completion, and the team is preparing to shift into Phase 3b, which focuses on surfacing westbound lanes 1 and 2 and verge modifications.

To carry out this next phase safely and efficiently, several overnight and daytime closures will be in place throughout July and early August:

#### **Key Closures:**


M27 junctions 7 & 8 westbound entry slips: Overnight closures between 10 July and 4 August, 9:00pm–6:00am Complete closure at Junction 7 westbound entry slip: 9:00pm 10 July to 6:00am 16 July Followed by a lane closure (one lane open) until 4 August

M27 junctions 5 & 7 westbound exit slips: Overnight closures between 10 July and 4 August, 9:00pm–6:00am

Diversion routes will be clearly signed, routing traffic via junctions 3, 8, or 9 depending on the closure location and direction of travel.

These closures are essential to ensure safe alignment between resurfaced slip roads and the new carriageway height. While some works extend beyond night hours, this short-term disruption allows National Highways to avoid extended closures during future phases, due to run through to January 2026.

# Halterworth Lane Improvement Works – Update & Schedule

To help reduce disruption for residents, commuters, local businesses and nearby schools, I've been working with Highways colleagues and as a consequence we're reprogramming the construction works along Halterworth Lane to minimise daytime closures wherever possible.

What's happening? Hampshire County Council are carrying out footway and safety improvements along the south side of A3090 Winchester Road. These works are designed to make the route safer and more accessible for pedestrians and cyclists, with enhancements to visibility at key crossing points.

Key improvements include: • Widening the footway between Winchester Road and Silverwood Rise
• A 3-metre-wide shared footway between St Swithun's Cottage and The Mandarin Chef •
Realignment and narrowing of the Halterworth Lane junction with Winchester Road • Enhanced crossing with tactile paving • Resurfacing approx. 50m along Halterworth Lane • Updated signage and new bollards to prevent vehicles entering footways

Phased Roadworks Schedule:

Phase 1: Full 24/7 road closure of Halterworth Lane – 2nd to 6th July

Phase 2: Night-time closures (18:00–07:00) – 7th to 13th July, with multi-way lights during the day (no HGV access during this phase)

Phase 3: Ongoing works with multi-way signals until 1st September

Thanks for your patience as we carry out these important improvements — I'll continue to keep you updated as the works progress.

# Recycling Myth-Busting – Advice from Test Valley Borough Council

There's a lot of confusion about recycling—we hear it all the time. So here at Test Valley Borough Council, we want to set the record straight by tackling some of the most common myths:

"Recycling doesn't make a difference" It absolutely does. Recycling conserves resources, reduces pollution, and keeps valuable materials in use. Plus, many charities rely on recycled items like clothes and books for income.

"It's too time-consuming" Once you set up a simple system at home—just a bin in the kitchen or bathroom—it only takes a moment to sort recyclables, and the environmental benefit is massive.

"You don't need to clean recyclables" Actually, you do! Please ensure items are clean, dry and loose. Rinse bottles, tins and cans in leftover washing up water and keep cardboard clear of grease or food.

"Recycling costs more than it's worth" Wrong again—recycling an aluminium can saves around 95% of the energy used to produce one from raw materials. And don't forget the cost of disposing of materials that could've been recycled.

"You must follow the labels" Not always helpful! With Test Valley's simple system, you don't need to worry about plastic types. We accept all plastic bottles (with lids), plus paper, cardboard, tins, cans and aerosols.

"Wrong items get sorted out anyway" Unfortunately, no. It costs £1.9 million every year in Hampshire to remove non-recyclable items from recycling bins. If in doubt—leave it out.

### Simpler. Stronger. Secure.

This week a consultation is being launched by some councils in Hampshire and the Solent about the future shape of local government in our area. Each council is being asked to submit a proposal for how new council areas should be created.

Hampshire County Council is also reviewing early options for the future shape of local councils across Hampshire and the Solent and will be consulting on our proposal later this summer.

Under Government plans, all two-tier areas must transition to single-tier unitary councils by 2028—meaning changes to how local services are delivered. The aim? To create simpler, more efficient councils that are financially resilient and responsive to residents' needs. I absolutely recognise there is a huge risk this will not be the outcome, which is why HCC are undertaking a rigorous assessment of options before suggesting a solution.

It's vital that any new councils created protect the high-quality services upon which residents rely—and ensure long-term financial strength.

Four possible options are now being assessed, each grouping local authority areas differently. Here's a quick look:

Option 1: Three-unitary model

North: Basingstoke & Deane, East Hampshire, Hart, New Forest, Rushmoor, Test Valley, Winchester

South: Eastleigh, Fareham, Gosport, Havant, Portsmouth, Southampton

Isle of Wight: Remains as a stand-alone unitary

(Let me be very clear, I do not believe this model should be promoted, the areas are too large, and the risks created by merging the services of so many councils together are too great. This model though should be explored to provide a base line for our deliberation.)

Option 2: Four-unitary model (South split in two)

North: Basingstoke & Deane, East Hampshire, Hart, Rushmoor, Test Valley, Winchester

South-West: Eastleigh, New Forest, Southampton South-East: Fareham, Gosport, Havant, Portsmouth

Isle of Wight: Stand-alone unitary

Option 3: Variant four-unitary model (Test Valley shifted)

North: Basingstoke & Deane, East Hampshire, Hart, Rushmoor, Winchester

South-West: Eastleigh, New Forest, Southampton, Test Valley

South-East: Fareham, Gosport, Havant, Portsmouth

Isle of Wight: Stand-alone unitary

Option 4: Five-unitary model (more localised focus)
North-East: Basingstoke & Deane, Hart, Rushmoor
Central: Test Valley, Winchester, East Hampshire
South-West: Eastleigh, New Forest, Southampton
South-East: Fareham, Gosport, Havant, Portsmouth

Isle of Wight: Stand-alone unitary

What's next? A preferred option will be selected this summer for public feedback. Final proposals will be submitted to Government this autumn, before a further Government led consultation in 2026.

# Have your say on Test Valley's future - Consultation open on next Local Plan

TVBC are inviting residents to comment on the Revised Regulation 18 Draft Local Plan 2042, which sets out how Test Valley could meet the Government's new housing target of 934 homes per year — a 78% increase from the previous figure.

This 10-week public consultation runs from Friday 27 June to noon on Friday 5 September 2025 and focuses on how the council plan to accommodate this growth while coordinating essential infrastructure.
